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




Inequality matters

It matters because it has the potential to shape opportunity


- "The poor stay poor, the rich get rich" is a statement about mobility
- The discussion this evening takes "mobility" to mean "mobility across the generations", a proxy for equality of opportunity
 - are rich parents likely to see their children become the rich adults of the next generation?
 - are poor parents raising the next generation of poor adults?

Mobility is lower where inequality is higher does the increase in inequality imply that mobility will be lower?



... but three broad institutions determine life chances

the overlap and interaction between families, markets, and the state together determine social mobility – there is no "silver" bullet



- Families with more Human Capital invest more in their children
- Families with more children invest less in each child
 - n increase in the cost of Human Capital investment reduces the amount invested
- A higher return to Human Capital encourages more investment

- Deny
 - has inequality increased?
 - even if it has, it doesn't matter because we have mobility
- 2 Recognize
 - inequality is on the rise, but what are the causes?
 - how will these factors influence mobility?
- Respond
 - where are the best points to intervene?
 - can public policy be effective?
 - what are the trade-offs?
